Introduction

On Ash Wednesday, we begin again our Lenten journey of renewal and conversion. On this day we traditionally had our foreheads marked with ashes in the sign of the Cross with the words 'Dust you are and into dust you shall return'

This year as we are unable to be marked by ashes in our churches, we offer this simple prayer resource to support families in prayer on Ash Wednesday at home. We pray that Lent 2021 will be a journey of renewal for families, for the community, and for the world.

Pope Francis, reflecting on the ashes traditionally imposed on our foreheads at the start of Lent, said:

"We are dust in the universe. Yet we are dust loved by God." The Holy Father added that we are precious dust that is destined for eternal life. He described Lent as a time of grace during which we can change our lives by letting God gaze upon us with love.

This Ash Wednesday we need so badly to feel God's gaze of love in the midst of signs of suffering and death all around us as the pandemic continues to claim lives and livelihoods.

As we begin our walk with Jesus to the cross and resurrection, we unite our mortality and limits to Christ's own suffering and passion in order that we might share his divine life. We know that Easter will come and that Christ is risen.

We pray for God's grace this Lent to respond to his loving invitation, the call to repent. In returning to the Father, we experience the deep compassion of God that compels us too, to be compassionate to others. (Families are welcome to use whatever part of the resource works best for their family prayer)

'Come Back to Me' God's Loving Invitation

In the name of the Father, of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

Opening Prayer

Lord, as we begin this holy season of Lent, grant us a change of heart that we might turn away from sin and follow your Son's Gospel. By your grace, may our lives become more deeply rooted in prayer, self-sacrifice and a willingness to share.

Let us walk with you this Lent as we face our own limitations and seek to be your presence in the world. Create in us clean hearts that we might know, love, and serve you better through our service of others. Amen.

Scripture

'Now, now – it is the Lord who speaks – come back to me with all your heart, turn to the Lord your God again, for he is all tenderness and compassion, slow to anger, rich in graciousness, and ready to relent. (Joel 2:12.16)

And the Lord said: I will give you a new heart, and place a new spirit within you, taking from your bodies your stony hearts, and giving you hearts of love. I will put my spirit within you, and make you live by my ways, careful to observe my decrees. (Ezekiel 36: 26-27)

Reflection

Pope Francis reminds us if we allow ourselves to be shaped by the hands of God, we become - "something wonderous, since we are the dust of the earth, upon which God has poured out his heaven, the dust that contains his dreams. We are God's hope, his treasure and his glory."

Sin wounds us, our relationship with each other and ultimately with God. Sin leads us into darkness, sorrow, desolation and isolation from those whom we love most. It is in this darkness and isolation that God reaches out to us from the abundance of his love.

Lent is a period to return home to the Father and live deeply a new life of love and oneness with God.

'Lord, I will turn my face towards you.
I will lay before you the desert areas I hide
And turn to soak in your refreshing words of life
I will cast aside the barren, selfish pursuits
And turn to rest in the tranquil warmth of your love.

I will draw back from the harsh pull of media

And turn to bathe in the gentle power of your Spirit.

Lord, today I turn my face towards you.'
